1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Parimal Mitra Smriti Mahavidyalaya, is a coeducational, multi-streaming institution affiliated to the University of North Bengal. It falls under the (20 Mal ST) constituency of Jalpaiguri district. As the only college in a tribal belt, within a radius of 30 km, it has, over the years catered to the needs of a population of students, that is dense and diverse.

Founded on September 19, 1985, our college offers courses in fifteen subjects in the different streams of Arts, Commerce and Science out of which eight are core courses. Four more subjects: namely, Botany, Zoology, Economics and Sociology are set to be transformed into Major with the introduction of NEP curriculum in our state from 2023-2024 academic session.

Since a large number of students are first generation learners, coming from the underprivileged sections of the society, the college offers a range of subjects for the general students. Our college at present is the study centre of two premier Universities providing distance education: Indira Gandhi National Open University (IGNOU) and Netaji Subhas Open University (NSOU). These study centres have been extremely beneficial for the people of the locality who find in our college a hub offering a wide range of courses beyond the regular curriculum-based activities.

The concept of education has undergone rapid change in the past few years. The increasing emphasis on student-centric initiatives, the wholesome role of the teacher as a mentor, and the ushering in of digital era has reoriented our thought process. As a Grant-in-aid college, we try to keep pace with the changing times. The IQAC, ever since the first cycle of NAAC assessment, submits the Annual Quality Assessment Report (AQAR) on the basis of the seven prescribed criteria to NAAC. This Self Study Report (SSR) hinges on these seven criteria in the light of which the college activities and thereby its present status is assessed. Much is yet to be achieved, but we have also come a long way forward. With our collective effort, passionate zeal and boundless optimism we are confident of taking long strides, despite all odds, towards a radiant and promising future.

Mission

Our visionary goals accordingly make us mission bound to stretch ourselves, extend our horizon and strive undeterred to:

- Ensure equal access to the facilities and resources in our college by all students thereby redressing the imbalance that we feel exists / is perceptible between the urban and rural community in this tribal belt.
- To identify and address the different academic and psycho-social needs of the dense population of our students. We supplement the classroom teaching with remedial coaching, tutorial classes, motivational lectures and various counselling sessions and strive to live up to the role of a mentor in the true sense of the term.
- Motivate and facilitate quality research by the faculty and students. The mobilization of funds for research projects and simultaneous augmentation of our college infrastructure are amongst our prime concerns. We aspire to establish our college as an authorized research center by the University.
- Create avenues of revenue generation for the college that will enable us to proceed with our planned activities in our own capacity / ease the progression of our planned activities.
- Emphasize interdisciplinary, multidisciplinary ventures in the college. The inter-departmental classes, addon courses, eco-friendly projects like the solid waste management are examples of such fruitful collaborations that we seek to extend to other arenas in the coming years.
- Revive at the earliest the National Service Scheme (NSS) unit of our college which has for long been the kernel of our contentment and strength.
- Ensure mutual accountability in college operation by prioritizing open communication and feedback from different stakeholders.
- Develop employability skills of the students and lead them towards self-reliance through several career

counselling and placement initiatives.

• Enhance the use of ICT tools by the different stakeholders and thereby promote digitized modes of operation at the institution.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

- As the only college within a radius of 30 km in a tribal belt in Western Dooars, we cater to the needs of a diverse, dense population of students.
- Our college is prominently located on the National Highway at a distance of barely 4 km from the New Mal Railway Junction.
- Located besides the Mal River, close to Son Gachhi Tea Garden, the clean and green campus of the college upholds an ambience that is picturesque, refreshing and naturally inviting. The college has a mahogany garden, a small park and a herbal garden that are well-maintained.
- The human resource at our disposal is our main strength. Our children are full of potential.
- Our faculty members are highly qualified, experienced and committed, who mentor the students with lot
 of dedication and care
- Most of the teachers have Ph.D. The in-house resource persons are actively engaged in quality research and have earned accolades for the institution through their presentation at different conferences and seminars of national and international repute.
- We adhere strictly to the reservation policies of the Government at the time of admission. A high percentage of the total students belongs to the different backward sections of the society.

- We have maintained a very high rate of disbursal of the various schemes, scholarships for the students as available from the Government and other sources.
- Spread over 13.69 acres of land, the sprawling campus of the college houses two four storied buildings where the classes of the fifteen departments are held. Besides the main building where Humanities and Commerce classes are held, we have now a separate building for the Science stream with well-equipped laboratories.
- NCC has been a very strong component of our college. They have ably discharged their social responsibilities and earned several laurels over the years. wing. With the implementation of the NEP curriculum from 2023-2024 session, NCC is all set to be introduced as an Inter-Disciplinary Course.
- The college is the study centre of two premier universities providing distance education: Indira Gandhi National Open University (IGNOU) and Netaji Subhas Open University (NSOU).

Institutional Weakness

- The grossly disproportionate mentor mentee ratio is a primary area of concern. The teaching strength has progressively increased over the years but so has the demand for more, especially in some subjects in Humanities stream. For the classes with large student strength, we divide them into different sections and conduct accordingly. The college does not have the authority to appoint new full-time teachers on its own and can only submit requisition to the Government for new acquisition. To meet the growing need, we appoint some guest teachers on purely temporary basis so as to ensure proper and timely transaction of the curriculum to our students in their best interests.
- The location of the college in the forest belt of Western Dooars, hinders the augmentation of transportation and communication facilities. Paucity of bus and train service eats into the attendance of the students, especially in the early and the last classes of the day.
- Hostel facility is not available
- The three flourishing NSS units of our college have been on suspended animation for the past five years. We have recently revived the NSS from 2023-2024 academic session.
- We lack a proper auditorium.
- The seating capacity of the reading room of the Central Library is not adequate. We are trying to resolve this problem by constructing a separate building for the Central Library next year.
- Augmentation of ICT tools is a dire necessity. We are working to install a smart board next year.
- The computers for academic purposes are far from adequate.
- College office is grossly understaffed. The retirement of some senior staffs and the untimely demise of one has augmented the problem.

Institutional Opportunity

- Located in a tribal belt, and the only college within a radius of 30 km, the college has enough scope to contribute to the uplift of the local community.
- The presence of young, highly qualified, resourceful, dynamic faculty makes us determined to foreground our institution as an incubation centre for genuine, quality research with the development of adequate infrastructure.
- The sprawling campus of the college facilitates our engagement in different activities within our college premises and augmentation of the infrastructure to meet our growing needs. The construction of an auditorium and a separate building for our Central Library which, at present, is rather inadequately accommodated in the main building are amongst our topmost priorities.
- Surrounded by Tea Garden, we can engage in fruitful collaboration with the tea industry and enhance the placement opportunities of students
- We are striving to tap the resources around and engage in more collaborative ventures with other organizations in the days ahead in common interest of all.
- We have a mixed array of teaching and non-teaching staff in the college, some of whom are poles apart in regard to computer proficiency. We are planning to introduce a basic course in computer for those unversed with our inhouse resources. This will help to bring all at par with each other and facilitate the smooth conduct of the activities of the institution in the digital era.

Institutional Challenge

- The students coming from diverse linguistic background have a persistent demand for multiple version classes which is often a challenging task for us. Except the departments of language and literature, most of the faculty members of our college are Bengali-speaking who are conversant in English. Few departments have teachers who are Nepali-speaking or are proficient in that language. We strive to go beyond our limitations and reach out to the students, other than those from the language and literature departments, in English, Bengali and Nepali, the three languages recognized for UG examinations by our affiliating North Bengal University.
- The location of the college in the backward, tribal belt is always throwing fresh challenges requiring us to work harder towards the dissemination of quality education and uplift of the local community

- The college is yet to open avenues of revenue generation
- The college is facing challenges to get sanctioned posts for non-teaching staff.
- We are striving to increase the efficiency of the staff and move towards complete e-governance

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

As an under graduate college, affiliated to the University of North Bengal, Parimal Mitra Smriti Mahavidyalaya follows the curriculum framed by the Under Graduate Council and adopts measures for timely and effective dissemination of the same. The voice of the college regarding the framed curriculum is carried forward by the departmental representations on the Board of Studies.

From 2018 Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) has been implemented by the University of North Bengal at the under graduate level. At present our college offers fifteen programmes based on CBCS out of which eight are in core courses. The academic calendar, master routine, departmental calendar and teacher's diary testify to the systematic, meticulous planning at the college, departmental and individual level for transaction of the curriculum to the students.

The curriculum of different disciplines has intersecting areas dealing with pressing issues of the times which are disseminated to our students through interdisciplinary lectures and by special lectures delivered by eminent personalities from different walks of life.

Besides the traditional classroom teaching, the teachers resort to different teaching modules viz. student seminar, educational excursions and ICT based classes to make the process interactive and engaging.

The lockdown enforced by the pandemic has made us familiar with the virtual classroom and e-learning modules / methods thereby initiating us into the world of blended learning.

Add On courses have been started to provide specialized knowledge and enhance the skill of our students.

Our effort reflects on the feedback received from different stakeholders on the academic ambience of our college thereby stimulating us to move ahead with firm determination.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

As an educational institution, teaching-learning and evaluation is the core of our activity and it is integrally student-centric. Situated in a tribal belt and the only college within a radius of 30 km, our student population is dense, essentially diversified with representation from different reserved categories, in strict conformity with the Government and university norms.

Our teachers are highly qualified and experienced, whose passionate involvement with the students is our main strength. Through different learning methodologies viz. group discussions, student seminars, case studies, field work and educational excursions we make education interactive, interesting, and effective. By blending the traditional lectures with ICT tools, supplementing stipulated classes with tutorials, we address the special needs, academic as well as psycho-social, of the slow and advanced learners. Our motto is to facilitate increasing use

of ICT tools in teaching-learning, and moving ahead towards a bright future, leaving none behind.

Through different assignments and written exams, the teachers assess and enhance the preparation of the students for the University examination. Parent teacher meeting is conducted at regular intervals to chart out the course for betterment of the student.

The Programme Outcome and Course Outcome of all the fifteen programmes offered by the college is displayed on the website. The newly admitted students are briefed about the subject choices and the future scopes. While teaching, particular attention is given on developing fundamental concepts, sharpening their analytical and problem-solving skills to enhance their employability prospects. The attainment of the Programme outcome and course outcome ultimately reflects in the high success rate of the students over the years.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The relentless pursuit of academic excellence has been pivotal in all our endeavours to grow and flourish as an educational institution. The extension of knowledge base of the teachers as learning resources is accordingly amongst our topmost priorities. Our teachers are highly qualified, most of whom have completed their Ph. D. In the last five years three teachers have been awarded Ph. D. one teacher has been assigned Ph. D supervisor last year. They have presented papers in National, International conference and their research papers have been published in peer reviewed, UGC CARE listed journals of national and international repute. Several of the teachers have authored individual books or chapters in edited volumes. In the 5th Regional Science and Technology Congress held on January 17-18, 2023 at Cooch Behar Panchanan Barma University, three teachers won the outstanding paper award in different categories, one of whom one was invited to present his paper in the West Bengal State Science and Technology Congress held at the convention Centre, Science City, Kolkata on February 28-March 01, 2023 and won the outstanding paper award there too.

At our college we try to provide a comprehensive education that fosters an innate sense of responsibility and commitment to the society. Round the year, our students with NCC Cadets from 61 Bengal Battalion at the helm, participate in different extension outreach programmes, and have earned five governor medals in the last five years.

Together we live and learn. Over the years we have collaborated with different organizations, institutions for enhancement and progression of different activities. We have signed MOU with other academic institutions for mutual enrichment, NSOU for distance learning, NGO to engage in community welfare, other organizations as skill enhancement initiatives. Our teachers are engaged in collaborative research with other institutions, organizations. Thus, we have endeavoured to extend our horizon, grow as an academic institution, and in so doing nurture our students as academically proficient, socially committed, self-reliant, skilled, and employable.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The augmentation of infrastructure and learning resources is an innate necessity and hence a continuous process we engage in, to make best use of the sprawling campus of the college. Besides the four storied main building of the college houses Principal's chamber, IQAC room, teachers' lounge, office, girls' common room, sick room, Central library, classrooms for Arts and Commerce we have a separate four storied building which houses classrooms, well-furnished laboratories of the science subjects and Geography. Another two storied

building at the periphery of the campus houses the canteen, boys' common room, NCC room, sports room and is topped by two classrooms. Our classrooms are spacious and well-maintained, three of them are equipped with ICT tools (LCD projector, laptop) and serve as seminar halls. Our college is a WIFI zone and we have two smart rooms at present.

The Central library is partially automated with KOHA software, has OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue), is well stocked with books and journals that is regularly monitored and updated. The library subscribes to NLIST, has reading room, internet facility, printing, and photocopy machine.

The college has computers in Principal's room, IQAC room, staffroom, office, central library, taking the total tally to 22 computers with 125 MBPS bandwidth.

The financial budget, expenditure incurred on the maintenance of physical and academic support facilities is monitored by the Accounts section, the Internal and External audit team.

The college has a playground, where annual athletic meet and other programmes are held. Our sports room is well furnished, we have a spacious hall with a stage set with podium and microphone facilities for spontaneous arrangement of academic and cultural programmes.

The college has drinking water purification system, fire extinguisher, Generator, cycle, and car parking area. Separate and sufficient washrooms with all modern facilities are available for the Principal, teachers, office staff and students, with separate block for female students. From last year we have installed a sanitary napkin vending machine in the Girls' common room.

Thus, we strive to provide and augment the infrastructure and learning resources in common interest of all, associated with this institution.

Student Support and Progression

We consider it our bounden duty to ensure proper and adequate adoption of student supportive measures. Situated in a tribal belt, a large population of our students come from the reserved categories and we have over the years maintained a high success rate of disbursal of the government scholarships to them.

We have taken several initiatives to enhance the soft skills, facilitate their self-reliance and lead them towards a quality and meaningful life. The Add-on Courses on Communicative English, Nepali Lekhan Shaili, Art of Review, Mental Health, the workshop on Bengali recitation, Yoga and Mental Wellness are some pointed steps in this direction.

As an undergraduate general degree college, we do not have the scope of campus placement but the career counselling and placement cell arranges interactive, informative sessions about career opportunities with professionals from different fields, sends the students to training sessions and orientation workshops on various competitive examinations, beyond the college campus.

A significant section of our students, pursue higher studies in different universities of the state and some of them have become teachers after qualifying NET/SET.

We have an active and systematic grievance redressal mechanism in our college helmed by the Internal

Complaints Committee taking care of all grievances from different stakeholders. Ours has been a peaceful college, but occasional frictions have transpired nonetheless that have been instantly and amicably resolved.

Through different sports and cultural programmes we nurture the potential and facilitate harmonious growth of the young learners. Mixed community of students foster rich scope for cultural exchange and lend variety to the various cultural programmes that are arranged in our college.

The institution has a registered Alumni Association. They are an integral part of the college. They are invited in different college programmes and they, out of their own accord arrange different activities and skill enhancement initiatives for our current students. Their passion for the college reflects in their eager involvement in different activities in the best interests of the institution. Well-placed in life and passionate about the college, our alumni are indeed our prized possession.

Governance, Leadership and Management

We seek to present an accountable, and transparent governance which hinges on decentralization and participatory management. The Governing Body is the highest decision-making body while IQAC takes care of all the measures needed for qualitative enhancement of the institution. The Principal coordinates between them. The Secretary of the Teachers' Council initiates the formation of different committees at the beginning of each year that take care of different activities of the institution. The feedback received from different stakeholders is analysed and acted upon.

As an affiliated, grants in aid college, our institution is guided by the statute of the University of North Bengal. The teachers on substantive posts are appointed as per the recommendations of the West Bengal College Service Commission and their subsequent promotion proceeds through IQAC in conformity with the Career Advancement Scheme stipulated by the University Grants Commission.

Moving with the times, we have endeavoured to employ e-governance in different areas of operation. The admission system of the college is completely digitized. The official procedures of the University Examination are conducted online through the portal controlled by the University. The finance and accounts section, is entirely digitized through WBIFMS. The formalities for pension proceed through the e-pension portal of the West Bengal government.

The institution provides ex-gratia to the casual non-teaching staff. The permanent employees can avail loan from provident fund, take festival advance and repay within a stipulated period at zero percent interest. Income and expenditure are strictly monitored by the Accountant under supervision of the Principal. The external audit is conducted annually by an auditor appointed by the Government of West Bengal.

Since its inception in 2015, the IQAC has been pivotal in the quality enhancement of the institution. It arranges seminars and workshops with other departments, sends teachers to different faculty development programmes, arranges workshops for the non-teaching staff. Academic audit is conducted annually and follow up action is taken. With such pro-active, dynamic leadership, we hope to scale great heights in near future.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

As a co-educational institution we try to instil in our students a feeling of mutual respect and amity for each

other. Gender equity is a basic step in this regard. We try to ensure balanced representation of the students in all activities of the college. We have a lady attendant to address special needs of girls. There is a separate block for girls' toilet. We have installed a sanitary napkin vending machine in our Girls' Common Room. We regularly arrange special lectures by eminent personalities to create gender sensitization and character development. The Gender Audit certificate is a measure of our success in this regard.

As a safety and security measure, the campus is under CCTV surveillance.

We engage in tree plantation round the year and have at present a herbal garden, a small park and a mahogany garden within the sprawling campus of our college. As a drive towards tapping alternate sources of energy we have installed solar panel, use LED bulbs. We have started a solid waste management programme in our college. The college is a no smoking, plastic free zone. We have a ramp and a wheel chair as a drive to create a disabled friendly environment in our college.

Our students are intrinsically varied and we are committed to provide an inclusive environment to all. Different cultural programmes provide a wonderful platform for cultural exchange. We observe International Mother Language Day when the faculty members and students speak and perform in their mother language. Observation of days of national importance namely Independence Day, Republic Day help us bond as a nation while National Voter's Day reminds us of our constitutional obligations. Extension outreach programmes help to instil in our students a sense of social responsibility and rootedness to their community. Out of the several constructive initiatives taken by the institution, two Best Practices, that have been undertaken on a regular basis, are:

- 2. Skill Enhancement Drive for a Self-Reliant Future

Three more subjects namely Botany, Zoology and Economics are all set to become major subjects with the implementation of the NEP from the session 2023-2024. The curriculum of different disciplines as framed by the Under Graduate Council has several intersecting areas concerning some pressing issues of the times namely: environment and sustainability, gender, ethics, and human values, thereby inviting us to look at the topic from different angles. We address these issues through interdepartmental classes. The reciprocal ventures in this regard enable mutually enriching faculty exchange programmes within the same institution. Environmental Studies is a subject taught by the teachers of Geography, Sociology besides a designated teacher in this department. The department of Bengali invites teachers from the English and Hindi departments to take classes on the History of English and Hindi literature which is included in their wide-ranging syllabus. The different departments collaborate in several beneficial and educational endeavours. With the Environmental Studies and Geography teachers at the helm we have started a solid waste management project to keep our campus eco-friendly. The Philosophy department supplements the theoretical classes on Yoga, an integral part of their Core course syllabus, with practical sessions conducted by Sri Sanjib Singha, the librarian of our college who is a certified yoga instructor. Our college regularly participates in the Youth Parliament Competition and has won several laurels over the years at the district level and has even emerged state champion once. The students are selected from different departments and nurtured by the faculty to represent our college at this platform which besides garnering their interest in parliamentary democracy, sharpens their oratorical skills and develops their personality. Seminars and workshops organised by different departments of the institution, special lectures on value-based topics, provide another area of fruitful collaboration between different disciplines. The extension outreach programmes are an integral part of the holistic education we seek to provide in which the students and teachers across different disciplines spontaneously participate. NCC has always been a strong component of our college. Their Governor medals, five won in the last five years, shine brightly on the institution, reflecting the yeomen service

rendered to society by our children. We are gearing up to offer NCC as a minor subject in the Value-Added Courses of NEP curriculum from next year to instill this feeling of national integration among more students besides those involved in the NCC wing. We are also working to introduce Physical Education as a major discipline with the introduction of NEP to open another avenue of employability for our talented, robust, agile students. The multidisciplinary, interdisciplinary character of our college reflects through such programmes and initiatives, making us ready to embrace NEP with full vigour from the next academic year.

2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

Academic Bank of Credits is a digital platform developed by the National e-governance division of the Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology under Digilocker framework. It is designed to store and transfer the academic credits earned by the students from Higher Education Institutions. It is an integral part of the National Education Policy 2020 which is all set to be introduced from the academic session 2023-2024. In such a situation, our educational institution is gearing up for the demands of the changing times. At present we follow a Choice Based Credit System as per the stipulations of the affiliating North Bengal University with effect from 2018. The admission procedure and filling in of examination forms have been completely digitized. Through seminars on NEP 2020 we are trying to make our students understand the meaning and purpose of the ABC. We are awaiting approval from the affiliating university to register officially on the ABC portal.

3. Skill development:

As an educational institution it is our persistent endeavour to make our students self-reliant for a bright future ahead. The development of their innate skills plays a vital role in this regard and is prioritized as one of the best practices of the institution. We have started some courses and workshops where interested students can register for free and sharpen their skills. The Add-On Courses on Communicative English, Nepali Lekhan Shaili, Art of Review have been started to enhance the communication skills in English and groom the budding writers in Nepali and Hindi. The Abbritti Shikshon Kormoshala, a workshop on recitation skills in Bengali is conducted for interested students. Since 2020-2021 session we

are observing Students' Week, annually when we test our students' skills, mental as well as physical agility, creative aptitude, through various competitions: song, dance, recitation, extempore, storytelling, quiz, painting, photography, instrumental and the like. Intra college football, volleyball, badminton competitions are also held on our playground during this week. We have hosted the District Level Youth Parliament Competition under the Department of Parliamentary Affairs, Government of West Bengal, on our college campus on November 9, 2019, where we secured the second position and won the Best Speaker award. Our students have surprised us with their spontaneous deliberation in a debate competition on Make in India – Skill India: Opportunities to the Next Generation, organized by the Ministry of Information and Broadcasting, All India Radio Siliguri to commemorate 75 years of Indian Independence on December 23, 2021. We have signed MOU with other organisations like Rice Education, The George Telegraph Training Institute, Frank Finn: Institute of Airhostess Training, Skill Hut, Brain Development Computer Academy to enhance the skills of our students and open different avenues of employment for them. As an undergraduate, general degree college, we do not have scope of campus placement unlike the technological institutions. Nonetheless, in our own way we strive to sensitize our students about different job opportunities. During the pandemic times, the Zoology department conducted a webinar on 'Employability Prospects in Bioscience.' Our institution has a career Counselling Cell which fosters students' interaction with successful professionals from different walks of life. On 19/1/21 Sri Sujit Lama from Matiali Police Station conducted an interactive session with our students where he enlightened them on the different steps towards enrolling into police force. NCC unit in collaboration with Career Counselling and Placement Cell organized a programme to inform the students about the different steps to enter Indian Army. On April 7, 2022 we joined hands with Pratham Education Foundation to arrange an awareness programme on skill development. A gentleman from the organization conducted an interactive session with the students where he acquainted them with various vocational training directed towards self-employment

that are available to the students at a nominal fee. We still have a long way to go. Several plans are yet to be materialized. Language lab is one of the foremost of them that we are working to arrange from next year.

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):

Located in a tribal belt in Western Dooars, our college caters to the needs of a student population that is as dense as varied. The variety reflects primarily in their different linguistic backgrounds. We offer them multiple version classes and reach out to them in the three languages recognized by the affiliating North Bengal University: English, Bengali and Nepali with an optimum utilization of our available resources. We have a literature block in our college comprising the four departments: Bengali, Hindi, English and Nepali. The curriculum framed by the UG Council, North Bengal University deals extensively with various branches of Indian language and literature that promotes interdepartmental discourses. English syllabus includes Sanskrit literature, other Indian literatures in English translation while Bengali syllabus has extensive portions dealing with the History of English and Hindi literature. The Philosophy syllabus provides valuable insights into the amazing depth of Indian Philosophical thought covering: Vedic and Upanishadic world-views, Carvaka, Jainism, Buddhism, Nyaya, and the doctrine of Samkhya. Students are acquainted with the Indian epistemological tradition where philosophical knowledge system comprises of Jnana, Vignana and Jeevan Darshana that have evolved out of experience, observation, experimentation, and rigorous analysis. The rich, ancient manuscripts enhance their problemsolving capacities. The students develop a capacity to organize ideas and issues, to deal with the question of values and to extract the essentials from large quantities of information. Department of History has a portion in the SEC syllabus on Archives and Museums and its relation to the society. To study the same, the Departmental teachers accompanied the students to Akshaya Kumar Maitreya Heritage Museum, University of North Bengal on September 3, 2018 as an educational excursion. These classes are supplemented with special lectures by eminent personalities to instil in our students, basic human values that characterize Indian culture and tradition. Dr. Jaya Adhikary from the Department of

Philosophy conducted a Periodical Lecture Programme on Values Embedded in Indian Culture funded by the Indian Council of Philosophical Research on March 20, 2019. Prof. Dilip Kumar Mohanta, University of Calcutta, and Prof. Raghunath Ghosh, North Bengal University were present as speakers. On March 28, 2022 IQAC arranged a lecture on 'Swami Vivekanada's Thoughts on Value Education' delivered by Swami Jnanalokananda, Secretary Ramakrishna Mission, Swami Vivekanada's Ancestral House. Thus, we endeavour to integrate Indian Knowledge System in the education we provide to our children, thereby instilling in them basic human values and a profound sense of identity and appreciation of Indian language, art and culture.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

We are committed to provide a quality education to the students that will facilitate the blossoming of their personality and make them competent for the big, wide world. To achieve this end, it is imperative that we focus on outcome-based education from the very beginning. Our college offers eight core course and six program courses to the students in different subjects from the disciplines of Humanities, Commerce and Science. An orientation session is conducted for the newly admitted students at the beginning of the academic session when they are briefed about the course outcomes and scope of the syllabus in the introductory classes. Through different student seminars, assignments, group discussions and written tests the progress of the students are monitored. Particular attention is given towards developing fundamental concepts, sharpening their analytical and problem-solving skills to enhance their employability prospects. The involvement of the students in different extension activities is the ultimate reflection of their holistic development that each program and the courses offered, endeavour to bring about in their own way. During the commencement of each unit and after the completion of the unit, the course outcomes are reviewed.

6. Distance education/online education:

The importance of online platform in the present digital era cannot be overstated. We at Parimal Mitra Smriti Mahavidyalaya have endeavoured to move with the times by embracing the new technology. The smart classrooms, ICT tools make education

interactive, participatory and interesting. Our college at present is the study centre of two premier Universities providing distance education: Indira Gandhi National Open University (IGNOU) and Netaji Subhas Open University (NSOU). These study centres have been extremely beneficial for the people of the locality who find in our college a hub offering a wide range of courses beyond the regular curriculum-based activities. Social media service offered by the dedicated Facebook page, WhatsApp group and You Tube channels of IGNOU Study Centre, Parimal Mitra Smriti Mahavidyalaya, enables easy and rapid access of all information regarding these courses to all concerned. The offline classes for these study centres are scheduled twice a week on the college campus after the regular classes. The prolonged shutdown necessitated by the pandemic has compelled us to turn to the virtual platform to ensure the continuance of the regular academic activities of the institution. The unprecedented crisis in human civilization has in a way facilitated our familiarity with the google meet classes and eresources, leading us thereby to the blended mode of learning which is here to stay in the present digital age.

Institutional Initiatives for Electoral Literacy

1. Whether Electoral Literacy Club (ELC) has been set up in the College?

An Electoral Literacy Club or ELC is a tool that enables an institution to inculcate, promote and propagate the essence of Democracy, that is, the Electoral process and people's participation in Voting. Parimal Mitra Smriti Mahavidyalaya, being a significant body as an educational institution in the region, has set up the ELC on September 25, 2018, to create a platform for the students to sensitize, participate in various interesting activities and accumulate hands-on experiences to learn their electoral rights and the process of registration for voting.

2. Whether students' co-ordinator and co-ordinating faculty members are appointed by the College and whether the ELCs are functional? Whether the ELCs are representative in character?

The faculty members of the Department of Political Science of our college are at the helm of the Electoral Literacy Club. There is one nodal officer while others serve as mentors. The regular students of the college are members of this club post registration to the

coordinating faculty members. Since its formation on September 25,2018, the Electoral Literacy Club is functional till date with major representation from the regular students as its registered members.

3. What innovative programmes and initiatives undertaken by the ELCs? These may include voluntary contribution by the students in electoral processes-participation in voter registration of students and communities where they come from, assisting district election administration in conduct of poll, voter awareness campaigns, promotion of ethical voting, enhancing participation of the under privileged sections of society especially transgender, commercial sex workers, disabled persons, senior citizens, etc.

The basic objectives of the Electoral Literacy Club are as follows: • To educate and aware the students of their "Right to vote" and facilitate through them greater participation of the local community in the electoral process. • To engage their minds in thoughtful understanding and critical thinking of various issues related to the functioning of a Democracy, conducting of the electoral process and electoral rights of the citizen. • To educate the students on the process of enrolment for the vote along with functioning and usage of EVM/ VVPAT • To develop, guide and motivate the culture of ethical voting, making them aware of electoral malpractices and other illegal activities related to elections. • To help them imbibe the principles of "Every Vote Counts" and "No voters to be left behind". It is the prerogative and also the responsibility of the Nodal officer/Mentor to take care of the following: • Promoting and supervising students' enrolment for the ELC • Coordinating between the District Election Officer and the ELC for exchange of information, resources, etc. • Guiding and supervising the activities of the Electoral Literacy Club for the academic year. Under the guidance of the Nodal Officer / Mentor, the Electoral Literacy Club has over the years, actively engaged in the following activities: • Identifying and engaging the newly admitted students as members of ELC • Conducting the activities under the guidance of the Mentor/Nodal Officer as required. • Participating and assisting in arranging different activities like awareness building and training sessions or any other task as assigned by the Mentor/ Nodal Officer. • Arranging quiz competitions on related matters to engage the interest and enhance the awareness of the young voters.

4. Any socially relevant projects/initiatives taken by College in electoral related issues especially research projects, surveys, awareness drives, creating content, publications highlighting their contribution to advancing democratic values and participation in electoral processes, etc.

As an educational institution Parimal Mitra Smriti Mahavidyalaya has always endeavoured to sensitize students about their democratic rights and enhance through them people's participation in the electoral process. Even before the formation of the Electoral Literacy Club, the sensitization of the new voters about their electoral duties and constitutional obligations were conducted with the observation of

National Voter's Day on January 25, every year. The formation of the Electoral Literacy Club on September 25, 2018 has provided a definite platform and new vigour to such activities. The Nodal officer coordinates between the District Election Officer and the ELC for exchange of information, and other resources. The newly admitted students are sensitized and prompted to join the club as young adults. Under the guidance of the Nodal Officer and other mentors, awareness drives are conducted for the new voters. The member students are stimulated to participate in large numbers in the various activities conducted by the Block officials.

5. Extent of students above 18 years who are yet to be enrolled as voters in the electoral roll and efforts by ELCs as well as efforts by the College to institutionalize mechanisms to register eligible students as voters.

The Electoral Literacy Club conducts awareness camp in collaboration with the Election Cell at the Block level. These camps aimed at first voter awareness, provide information to the students about how to enroll their names in the voter list if it is not yet done. We sensitize the students on the need to get their names enrolled in the voter list and extent cooperation in this regard. The college acts as a communicating link between the new voters and the Election cell at the Block level. But since we don't directly enroll their names, we cannot specify the extent of students who are above 18 years and are yet to be enrolled as voters at present.

Parimal Mitra Smriti Mahavidyalaya, located in Malbazar, Jalpaiguri, is committed to catering education and fostering social consciousness among its diverse student population, particularly within a region predominantly inhabited by tribal communities. Affiliated with the University of North Bengal, the college adopts a distinct approach to curriculum implementation, aligning with its own objectives to improve the quality of education and student outcomes.

Since the 2018-19 academic year, the institution has integrated the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) at the undergraduate level alongside the existing three-year graduation 1+1+1 system. The Academic Sub-Committee develops and communicates an academic calendar to ensure transparent dissemination of the curriculum established by the Undergraduate Council. Teachers' Council meetings prioritize discussions on teaching-learning methodologies, fostering readiness for classes. A comprehensive time-table is then formulated and shared with department heads for class scheduling, subsequently posted on notice boards and the website each semester.

Despite the challenges presented by the COVID-19 pandemic, the University of North Bengal revised college syllabi during the lockdown period from 2020 to 2022, transitioning academic activities online. Teachers swiftly adapted to e-learning methods, including online lectures and student webinars, to sustain an interactive educational environment. Virtual Teachers' Council meetings and college events were arranged to ensure continuity.

Detailed college information, encompassing courses and accomplishments, is readily available on both the college website and the PMS Mahavidyalaya App, facilitating seamless access for new students via the online admission portal. Over the past five years, departments such as Political Science, English, Hindi, Nepali, Zoology and also through the able coordination of the teacher of Environmental Studies have introduced supplementary courses to enhance communication skills and equip students with additional relevant knowledge.

Moreover, teachers actively engage in regular classes, each undertaking specific responsibilities/ workload according to departmental schedules. They also fulfill various academic obligations assigned by the University, including paper setting, moderation, evaluation, reassessment, and scrutiny. Some faculty members serve as members of the Board of Studies and Academic Council, contributing to pivotal academic decision-making processes.

The PMS Mahavidyalaya App functions as a centralized platform for stakeholders to access college information and updates. Queries regarding the curriculum are directed through departmental

representatives on the Board of Studies. Teachers employ innovative methods such as PowerPoint presentations and educational excursions to enrich conventional teaching, while student progress is monitored through periodic assessments. The college also encourages student involvement in sports, cultural activities, seminars, and workshops for holistic development. Thus, the college endeavors to provide the best education and experience to its students with the available resources and opportunities, aiming to equip them for a bright future ahead.

They are given case studies to work upon, that not only sharpens their comprehension of the particular subject but also prepares them to meet life's challenges in the days ahead. The educational excursions, field works bring a breath of fresh air as the students move out of the confines of the classroom and are duly enriched by their experiences. This reflects on the reports they submit on returning to the college. The student-centric learning and an ambience conducive to the same is thus created for a harmonious development of our students' personality.

The arrival of Information and Communication Technology (ICT) has revolutionised the process of teaching. It has opened up new avenues of accumulating and disseminating knowledge that can be no longer ignored in the best interests of all. 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Assessment of students' academic progress is a vital part of teaching-learning. It helps us to gauge their understanding, arrive at an estimate of their present status, identify the advanced and slow learners and adopt measures accordingly. The academic calendar of the college is prepared in view of the calendar of the affiliating University of North Bengal. Internal examinations are conducted to evaluate the progress of the students before they sit for the University examinations. Question papers are prepared by the departmental teachers, the answer scripts are evaluated and marks for the internal assessment are uploaded in the university portal within stipulated time. Besides written test, the students are subjected to a process of continuous evaluation through student seminars, project work and other engagements at the departmental level to gauge their progress and prepare them adequately for the final University examination. Their performance is analysed at the departmental level by the teachers, discussed in the classroom with the students and also with their guardians at the parent teacher meetings. Thus, we keep a track of their progress, acquaint their guardians with the same, and motivate the students for better performance. When the lockdown disrupted our offline activities, the written tests were replaced by assignments undertaken on the virtual platform.

The final examinations at the Undergraduate level are fully controlled by the University. The students take the examination at their own college, under strict invigilation by the teachers. The question papers and answer scripts are provided by the University and also collected on completion of the examination. The evaluation process is monitored by the University maintaining full confidentiality and integrity of the same.

There is an active Grievance redressal mechanism at the college and also University to deal with all grievances related to the published results. At the college the students get to see their evaluated answer scripts, their mistakes are pointed out and all their queries are patiently addressed by the teachers. The modalities of the final examination is conducted entirely online by the University. The college issues notice regarding scrutiny and reassessment of the answer scripts for which the students have to apply online within the deadline stipulated by the university. Fresh marksheet is issued on receipt of the result of the review process.

Thus, the process of evaluation of the students is conducted in a systematic, transparent manner and the examination-related grievances of the students, if any, are resolved in an effective and time-bound manner both at the college and university level.

The college offers education in fifteen subjects in the three streams of Arts, Commerce and Science out of which eight are in core courses. The Programme Outcome and Course Outcomes for all the programmes offered by the institution are clearly stated and displayed on the website. This helps the students to get an idea about the overall scope of each programme as also the knowledge, skills and competency they are expected to gain from each course. The career prospects of each programme shine through these programme and course outcomes and their visibility on the website helps the students to decide their choice of subjects at the time of admission.

The admission process is conducted entirely online after which the students come to the college for physical verification of their documents. At that time the students are counselled by the faculty members about the subjects chosen, and future scopes. Here the students get a further explication of the Programme and Course Outcomes and they have the option to change their combination subjects with the Core Course which remains unchanged.

Syllabus and the Course Outcomes corresponding to each subject are discussed by the respective departmental faculties at the beginning of the academic session. Orientation session is conducted with the newly admitted students when they are briefed about the course outcomes and scope of the syllabus. Particular attention is given towards developing fundamental concepts, sharpening their analytical and problem-solving skills so as to develop their employability prospects.

The institution thus endeavours to guide the students in their academic choices and brighten their career prospects by displaying the Programme Outcome and Course Outcomes on the website, counselling in person as the students arrive at college, and acquainting them with the courses and their respective syllabus in the introductory classes at the beginning of each academic session.

During the commencement of each semester and after the completion of the same, the attainment of the Programme Outcome and Course Outcomes are reviewed.

Response:

Parimal Mitra Smriti Mahavidyalaya as an educational institution is committed towards pursuing academic excellence. Accordingly, the institution prioritises innovation and incubation of knowledge.

In so doing it lays especial focus on the extension of knowledge base of our faculty members. The college organizes seminars and conferences, and the teachers are granted leave to present papers at academic gatherings of repute. Most of our teachers are Ph. D and few have post-doctoral degree. In the last five years three teachers have been awarded Ph. D. one teacher has been assigned Ph. D supervisor. In the 5th Regional Science and Technology Congress held on January 17-18, 2023, three teachers won the outstanding paper award in different categories, one of whom one was invited to present his paper in the West Bengal State Science and Technology Congress held in Kolkata on February 28-March 01, 2023 and won the outstanding paper award there too. Dr. Shuvadeep Majumdar, Assistant Professor, Department of Botany discovered new plant species, the first of its kind in India in August 2022. Such achievements by our faculty members make us more determined to create adequate infrastructure and foreground our college as an incubation centre for genuine, quality research.

Dr. Remika Thapa, HOD, Department of Nepali is credited with the first translation in Nepali of Rabindranath Tagore's *Gitanjali* which has received rave reviews from eminent literary circles. On May 19, 2019 she has received Pratibha Prerna Puraskar from Pratibha Prerna Parishad, Darjeeling for her contribution to contemporary Nepali poetry.

Teaching-learning is essentially a two-way process and through student seminars, group discussions, case studies and field work we endeavour to make education interactive, participatory and interesting for the young learners. The ICT tools, smart classroom and blended mode of learning complements our endeavour in this regard. The library is well stocked with books, journals and subscription to digital resources. It is partially automated with KOHA and has introduced Open Public Access Catalogue (OPAC). The Library Orientation Day is observed to sensitise the new users about the available resources and increase the footfalls.

The curriculum framed by the UG Council, North Bengal University deals extensively with various branches of Indian language and literature which facilitates interdepartmental discourses. English syllabus includes Sanskrit literature, other Indian literatures in English translation, Bengali syllabus has extensive portions dealing with the History of English and Hindi literature. The Philosophy syllabus provides valuable insights into the amazing depth of Indian Philosophical thought covering: Vedic and Upanishadic world-views, Carvaka, Jainism, Buddhism, Nyaya, and the doctrine of Samkhya. Head of the Department, Dr. Jaya Adhikary conducted a Periodical Lecture Programme on Values Embedded in Indian Culture funded by the Indian Council of Philosophical Research on March 20, 2019. Thus, we are continuing in our endeavour of integrating Indian Knowledge System in the education we provide to our children.

Computer and Internet Facilities

Security Measures

All laptops and desktops are protected with strong passwords. Passwords are changed after every 30 days, and sharing passwords is forbidden. Access to the internet via Wi-Fi is protected from pornographic sites, hacking sites, and other risky sites. The whole college is under surveillance of CCTV. All important computers and laptops with access to the college network have an antivirus protector.

Classroom and Seminar Facilities

We have three ICT-equipped classrooms out of which one is smart classroom and the most spacious one serves as a seminar hall. We have a projector and laptop which enables ICT-equipped classes and the arrangement of seminars at the national and international levels.

Software and Tools

The software tools required by different departments are purchased or updated on a regular basis. Overall, the institution has well-equipped IT facilities that are vital for training students in state-of-the-art software and hardware.

Wi-Fi and Connectivity

Wi-Fi facilities have been available in our college since October 4, 2016. There was a persistent demand from students for easy access to all the important notices of the college despite the existence of the college notice board and the website.

We realized the need for a college app that would bring all the details together. PMS Mahavidyalaya App was launched on June 6, 2019. The Galaxy IT Station created the App. The App contains subsections: Website, NBU Course, College staff, Syllabus, Notice, and the like. College has also a dedicated website (www.pmsm.org). It is a comprehensive assemblage of information related to the college. It is regularly monitored and updated by the college authorities.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1

The institution has performance appraisal system, effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for career development/progression

Response:

Our institution undertakes various welfare measures for the teaching and non-teaching staff and participates in different welfare schemes initiated and approved by the Higher Education Department, Government of West Bengal.

Performance Appraisal System

The performance of faculty members is calculated as per the API score (the index of one's performance in his/her job) by the government for promotion. In case of promotion, on fulfillment of the prescribed criteria, the faculty member submits the filled in prescribed proforma for CAS to IQAC for approval in Governing Body. A forwarding letter is sent to the Higher Education Department and affiliated University for government nominee and subject expert respectively. After selection the applicant is promoted to the next stage as per UGC pay scale.

Feedback is collected from different stakeholders namely students, alumni, guardians besides teachers whereby they opine on the performance of the teaching staff, office, library service and other aspects of the institution. The feedback received is duly analyzed and acted upon.

Teachers fill in a diary where they mention details about relevant academic activities and other endeavors that they have individually undertaken.

There is no provision for PBAS for the non-teaching staff.

Welfare Measures are:

- General provident fund facility for all staff members in substantive posts.
- Participation in the "West Bengal Health Scheme for the Beneficiaries of Grant-in-aid Colleges and Universities 2017," by teachers appointed on substantive basis and librarian.
- Participation in "West Bengal Swasthya Sathi Scheme" by State Aided College Teacher and non-teaching staff.
- Release of festival bonus in advance from college account before festival to teaching and non-teaching employees on request with 0% interest. The same is recovered through monthly instalments.
- Loan facilities from Government Provident Fund as per government rules to employees on requirement.
- Provision of salary advance to newly joined teachers from the college account to meet the
 financial requirements of the teacher till the pay fixation by the Higher Education Department,
 Govt. of West Bengal. The amount obtained as an advance from the college is then refunded to
 the college once the fixation of pay is complete and the teachers start receiving their salary from
 the government treasury.
- Other initiatives: Regular distribution of sanitizer and liquid soap bottles in all washrooms keeping in mind their health and hygiene. Thermal guns have been purchased for the safety and welfare of all stakeholders.
- Annual picnics for the teaching and non-teaching staff are organized by the teaching and nonteaching staff with logistic support from the college.

Leaves and retirement benefits are:

- Pension and Gratuity benefits and encashment of Earned leave for retired employees.
- Leaves are allowed as per the University Statute and Government regulations.

- Duty Leaves are granted to the teaching staff members to perform University Examination related works assigned by the University of North Bengal.
- Duty leaves are also granted for participation in Seminars, Workshops Conference as per Government norms. For nonteaching staff duty leaves are granted for performing college related work.
- Study Leaves are sanctioned as per requirement.
- Leave accounts are maintained properly so that no staff member faces any difficulty at any point of time during and after the service period.

Mechanism for fund mobilization

- At the beginning of each financial year departments make plans and submit requisition for books, laboratory equipment, Chemicals and glass wares, Furniture, Computer and peripherals and also budget for seminars, webinars. Proposals are carefully scrutinized by the finance committee and sent to the Governing body for final approval.
- Purchasing is done through proper e-tendering. Wherever an expenditure of more than Rs 1,00,000/- is made, the procedure is done through e-tendering as per the current guidelines of the state government.
- Funds obtained from the State Government for payment of salary to employees are done through HRMS.

- The institute facilitates its students in procuring and accessing various scholarships, such as SVMCM, Kanyashree, student credit cards, and post-matric scholarships for SC/ST/OBC students.
- TALLY has been introduced for maintaining the financial account system
- The Institution is transparent in all its financial dealings. The Accountant and the Principal of the college regularly monitor the operation of financial transactions as per available funds.
- The institution conducts financial audits to maintain transparency in financial transactions
- The External financial audit is done by a government-appointed auditor.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes. It reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities

Response:

The IQAC plays an important role towards improvement of the overall performance of the institution. Primary focus being quality of education imparted, the IQAC in association with the Principal evaluate, initiates plan and executes activities accordingly to keep the teaching learning process in our college at par with the changing times.

More than dissemination of education from a superior vantage point, the teachers now are primarily mentors who assist the students in their journey forward. In our institution we abide by this principle. Special tutoring is provided to the weak students besides the regular classes. The advanced learners get the extra resources they need to excel. Besides the academic requirements, we try to mentor them on a personal level and address their psycho-social needs.

Some Add-On Courses have been introduced on the recommendation of IQAC to sharpen the employability, skills, life skills of our students and lead them to a bright, prosperous, meaningful life.

The ICT tools are now an integral part of education. We have accordingly taken recourse to these modern methods while reaching out to our students. The college has one smart classroom and three ICT equipped classrooms, the more spacious one suitably furnished to serve as a seminar hall. Keeping in mind the diverse composition of our students, many of whom are first generation learners, we try to follow a blended mode of teaching in the classroom, mixing the traditional mode of giving lectures and board

work with the use of ICT tools.

Laboratories of newly established departments of Botany, Chemistry, Geography and Zoology have been set up and adequately furnished during the last five years. Photocopy machines has been installed in office and in library.

Academic audit is performed regularly to analyse and evaluate the departmental status and progress. IQAC also reviews the organizational structure, administrative process in association with administrative management. Financial audit is performed to ensure a transparent administration. Feedback from various stakeholders is collected and analyzed carefully. Further IQAC in collaboration with the faculty members takes up constructive measures/student centric approach to strengthen the academics as well as capital infrastructure of the institution for the benefit of its stakeholders.

IQAC also supports and takes initiative towards empowering the college staff. Our faculty members have participated in various programmes organized by recognized HRDCs throughout the country.

During the last five years IQAC has taken active involvement in organizing seminars and workshops on emerging and pressing issues of the time as a measure to inculcate awareness among the students.

We have a natural commitment to the local community. Over the years, IQAC has made it customary to engage in some activities directed towards community welfare. Covid Awareness Programme, Vaccination camp have been arranged in our college campus. Response:

Situated in a tribal belt, 'Parimal Mitra Smriti Mahavidyalaya' is attended by students from different caste, tribe and religious background. The true spirit of education is being practiced here i.e no discrimination against caste, religion or gender. The Institution provides a gender sensitive ambience to the students and staffs who can work with dignity and respect to each other without any discrimination. The college is committed to Gender Equity through its non- discriminatory policy guidelines and has taken several measures for the promotion of balance gender ratio in the campus.

- The following measures are taken to maintain the gender equity in our college campus:
- *Common room: The college provides separate Common Room for both Boys and Girls in the Campus. A well equiped spacious room with recreational facilities is provided to the students. Also, a sanitary pad vending machine is installed in the Girls Common Room to aid the students in hour of special need.
- * Safety and security: To promote a safe environment for everyone, the college has installed CCTV in the campus main gate, corridor, library. One female guard and one male guard are posted at the main entrance to the college campus. Students have to display their identity card to these guards before entering the premises for safety reasons.
- * Adequate Toilet facilities: The College has also provided separate washrooms for both boys and girls. Besides this, sufficient number of toilet blocks are available for other workers due to hygiene maintenance.
- * Strong Redressal System: The College has Anti women harassment cell, Grievance Redressal Cell, Women Help Desk to address issues related to sexual harassment. The college offers Psychological Counselling Cell to address mental health issues. Also, two Complaint boxes are placed inside the campus so that students can drop their complaint/issue in private and the Internal complaint committee' address these issues accordingly while maintaining confidentiality.
- * Curriculum on 'women's studies': Since 2018 the CBCS syllabus at undergraduate level has prescribed topics related to women issues in subjects like 'English, Political science, Philosophy, Education, Sociology' to inculcate awareness regarding gender inequity and promote gender empowerment. Ethics and Value Education is also prescribed in the syllabus for undergraduate students where moral values are discussed including Women's Rights.

Response:

Best Practices

1. Title of the Practice: Towards A Clean, Green, Eco-Friendly College Campus

Objectives of the Practice: We are determined to contribute to a clean, green, and more habitable earth. Towards that end we engage in several activities throughout the year. Besides promoting environmental awareness, such initiatives also foster a feeling of camaraderie between different stakeholders of the institution.

The Context: The indiscriminate turning of open spaces into residential complexes, the growing number of vehicles is adversely affecting the quality of life in the small, beautiful town of Malbazar. We have endeavoured to develop the sprawling campus of our college as an eco-friendly space exhibiting mankind's harmony with nature.

The Practice: This eco-friendly and cleanliness drive is undertaken at several quarters. Plantation and restoration of greeneries throughout the year is pivotal in this regard.

Saplings of local species, are collected from the nursery and planted on our college campus on different occasions.

In 2016, we planted some medicinal herbs, procured from local sources, that has initiated a herbal garden with immense nutritional value. The stock has been augmented with botanical plants over the years.

Mahogany trees, have been purchased from the nursery of the Social Forestry Department, Government of West Bengal. A beautiful garden has thus been initiated on our campus whose value will only grow with time.

While the trees keep the air fresh for us, we reciprocate by keeping our campus clean and free from hazardous wastes. Solid waste management is a step taken by us in this direction. We have considerably reduced the use of plastic in our campus. The garbage is collected in two containers: one for biodegradable products and the other for non-biodegradable products. We hand over the non-biodegradable products to the scrap collectors for recycling. The biodegradable products are dropped in a manure pit whereby they decompose as fertilizer that is used to nourish our greeneries.

Campus cleaning is an obvious activity we engage in. The NCC cadets lead from the front in this regard and their activities often reach beyond the college campus. They have engaged in hospital cleaning, neighbourhood cleaning, river cleaning and bus stop cleaning.

The college has a registered alumni association which arranges several programmes like cleanliness drive that reflect their passionate involvement in the welfare of the college.

Evidence of Success: Set on the banks of Mal River, near Songachi tea estate in western Dooars, the college has a locational beauty of its own. The sprawling campus of the institution abounds in greeneries with the herbal garden and mahogany garden, and a small park. The campus is picturesque and refreshing. The Green audit has been successfully conducted.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required: This is a long-term, ambitious project that demands regular, meticulous care. The lockdown enforced by the pandemic interfered into our solid management initiative and grossly depleted the herbal garden which had to be replenished with the resumption of campus activities. If we can develop a means of processing the fertilizer produced through decomposed waste materials, then it will open scope for revenue generation of the institution.

BEST PRACTICE II

Title of the Practice: Skill Enhancement Drive for a Self-Reliant Future

Objectives of the Practice: As an educational institution we are mission bound to lead our students towards a bright, prosperous future. We engage in several activities round the year, to identify and nurture their different skills. The basic objective is to enable them to let go of their inhibitions, and sharpen their latent qualities, thereby enhancing their employability prospects in the competitive world.

The Context: Often first-generation learners in their family, our students need an extra push to break their shackles and present their innate talent before all. We provide training, arrange programmes and competitions throughout the year for our students.

The Practice: The skill enhancement drive is undertaken at several quarters. We strive to make teaching learning interactive and participatory. The student seminars, group discussions, departmental wall magazines prepared by the students sharpen their critical thinking, power of literary and artistic expression.

We have started some courses and workshops where interested students can register for free and sharpen their skills. The Add-On Courses on Communicative English, Nepali Lekhan Shaili, Art of Review, the Abbritti Shikshon Kormoshala, a workshop on recitation skills in Bengali, are some pointed steps in this direction.

We have signed MOU with other organisations like Rice Education, The George Telegraph Training Institute, Frank Finn: Institute of Airhostess Training, Skill Hut, Brain Development Computer Academy to enhance the skills of our students and open avenues of employment for them.

We observe Students' Week, every year, when students get to participate in different competitions and events. In 2019 we hosted the Jalpaiguri District Level Youth Parliament Competition on our college campus.

The ultimate end of the skill enhancement initiative is to brighten the employable prospects of the students. We strive to sensitize our students about different job opportunities. The webinar on 'Employability Prospects in Bio-Science', the interactive session with Sri Sujit Lama from Matiali Police Station, the programme on Officer, Entry Scheme in Army, Navy and Airforce are some examples in this regard.

Evidence of Success: The enthusiastic participation of the students in large numbers in these programmes is encouraging.

Our students are well placed in life as academicians, vocalist, theatre actor, and have even served as spoken English teacher. Two of our students are at present working as SACT in the Hindi and Nepali departments of our college. In the district level Youth Parliament Competition in 2019, we received the second position, besides grabbing the best speaker prize as well. However, the greatest award for us has always been the sincere effort, spontaneous participation, and continued support of our students in all our endeavours.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required: The sprawling campus remains abuzz with activity which could have been conducted on a wider scale had there been no shortage of some essential resources. We are badly missing a proper auditorium. A language lab too would be immensely useful.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1

Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

Response:

Situated in a tribal belt in western Dooars we are committed to the uplift of local community. The task begins from the classroom where we meet our students inherently diverse representing different linguistic, cultural, religious, socio-economic background, a significant portion of whom are first generation learners. They have come so far, battling many odds. It is our bounden duty to assist them in their journey forward. As we run after the curriculum in a packed class of a mixed batch of students, some inevitably trail behind others. We identify them, and arrange tutorials besides the stipulated classes where we address the special needs of these slow learners, develop their writing skills, and bring them at par with their classmates.

We are firmly resolved to remove all impediments on the path of education of our children. Economic insufficiency is one of the foremost of these that we strive to combat. We have a Students' Welfare Fund from where we provide half-free, full-free exemption on the admission fees of the deserving registered students. During the pandemic we reduced the tuition fee by three months for all students, thereby facilitating the guardians to meet the educational expenses in that period of job uncertainties.

Besides these facilities provided by the college, we have maintained over the years a high success rate of disbursing the different scholarships provided by the Central and State government: Swami Vivekananda Merit Cum Means Scholarship for the meritorious, economically backward students, Aikyasree for SC, ST students, OASIS for the students from minority communities and Kanyasree for the unmarried girl students.

We have also endeavoured to tap other avenues for providing financial benefit to maximum number of our deserving students. Towards this end we have sent our students to participate in a written test held at Jalpaiguri and conducted by Ramakrishna Mission Institute of Culture, Golpark, Kolkata on September 4, 2022 for providing scholarship to the meritorious, needy students. Two of our children have excelled in the examination and acquired by their merit the prized scholarship of four thousand rupees.

Equality is the watchword for us. We are determined to do our bit to ensure equal distribution of resources and opportunities in an amicable, inclusive environment. Besides we believe in holistic development of our students that goes far beyond bookish learning. We arrange several extension outreach programmes round the year to instil in our students a feeling of rootedness to their community and generate in them a passion for social service. Blood Donation is a noble act and a pressing need especially in our locality with the overburdened government hospital, and the nearest blood bank miles apart in Siliguri. It is imperative to motivate the youngsters to donate blood and save humanity. We have arranged blood donation camp, thalassemia detection camp in collaboration with Mal Subdivisional Hospital on our college campus and have derived immense satisfaction when our children out of their own accord have engaged in such noble acts on other occasions. Mention in this regard may be made of NCC, which has always been a strong component of our college. They have discharged their social responsibility by engaging in several activities like neighbourhood cleaning, traffic maintenance, antiplastic campaign and the like. They have participated in a blood donation camp in collaboration with Mal Super Speciality hospital where twenty-one cadets have donated blood. Their governor medals shine brightly on our institution, reflecting the yeomen service rendered to society by our young cadets.

Unity in diversity that characterises our institution becomes even more prominent in the face of adversity. In the days of quarantine and social distancing we could not stay aloof. During the prolonged shutdown enforced by the pandemic, the science building on our sprawling college campus has served as a safe house for the infected patients. We have arranged Covid-19 vaccination camp within our college premises in collaboration with the health Department, Jalpaiguri District, Government of West Bengal. Besides the stakeholders of the college, the local community have come in large numbers to our institution to get vaccinated.

The spirit of togetherness of our institution finds another manifestation in the collaborative ventures we have undertaken for the greater common cause. Our institution has signed several MoUs with other educational institutions for mutual enrichment. Besides research collaborations for academic advancement of the faculty members, several lectures have been conducted under Faculty Exchange Programmes for the benefit of the students. Our teachers have also taken classes at the Higher Secondary Section of a Government-aided school in Malbazar.

We believe service to mankind is equivalent to service to God. We have signed MoUs with some NGOs and Tea-Gardens to work in unison in need-based community welfare programmes. Our teachers and students have taken classes for the underprivileged children in a remote village, distributed clothes, and blankets to the needy and conducted health awareness camp for the local people.

The students of our college, Parimal Mitra Smriti Mahavidyalaya have conducted the Annual Status of Education Report (ASER), a survey on the status of Primary Education in rural West Bengal, in collaboration with Pratham Education Foundation. 5. CONCLUSION

Additional Information:

In compliance with the recommendations received from the NAAC Peer Team during the first cycle of accreditation (date of visit: 05 to 07 September 2016), the institution has adopted the following measures:

Some new subjects have been introduced to offer wider course combination to the students. Science stream has been introduced with well-furnished laboratories in a new building.

ICT-based classes have progressively increased over the years though still greatly outnumbered by the conventional classes.

The college has embarked on some collaborations with NGOs and academic institutions for social welfare and academic enrichment. Efforts are on for more such initiatives in the coming years.

The College Library is partially automated. OPAC facility has been launched. The reading room has separate seating areas for teachers and students. We are planning to shift the library in a separate building from next year that will remove the problem of space once and for all.

Plantation has been conducted on a large scale and the Mahogany Garden, small park and the botanical garden have made the campus refreshing and inviting. Green audit, Energy audit have been successfully conducted.

Add-On Course on Communicative English has been conducted for the students, mainly from other departments. Besides, other skill enhancement courses like Abritti Shikshan Karmashala, Nepali Lekhan Shaili, Art of Review have been started for the students.

IQAC has gained in strength and has been actively engaged in implementing quality initiatives and charting the way forward for the institution.

A solar panel has been set up in the college premises and its loading capacity has been progressively increased. Solid waste management program has been started in our college. Thus, we have endeavoured to display our commitment to the environment and instil these basic values in our children.

Concluding Remarks:

Situated in a tribal belt and the only college within a radius of 30km in the forest area of Western Dooars, Parimal Mitra Smriti Mahavidyalaya has its work cut out. The student population is dense and represent different cultural, religious, linguistic as well as socio-economic background. We endeavour to provide all a holistic education that thrives by sharing and caring for each other in an open, equitable and inclusive environment. Since its humble beginnings in a makeshift building in 1985, the institution has come a long way as it stands tall in its sprawling campus, offering courses in all three streams of Humanities, Commerce and Science. Battling the natural calamities and paucity of communication services in the forest area, we are marching undeterred to establish our college as a premier institution of higher education that will contribute significantly to our nation's progress. The destination is miles apart, still a long way to go, but the journey has begun in real earnest.

- Introduce Computer Science as a subject
- Create a separate building for our Central library
- Create an auditorium
- Achieve complete e-governance
- Introduce self-financing vocational courses
- Create the infrastructure for research activities in our college
- Set up a language lab in our college
- Get more sanctioned posts for the teaching and office staff
- To enter into MOU with industries for internship and placement of our students

Blessed with dynamic, focussed leadership, committed, enthusiastic professionals and talented young learners, we are very hopeful of our future.
